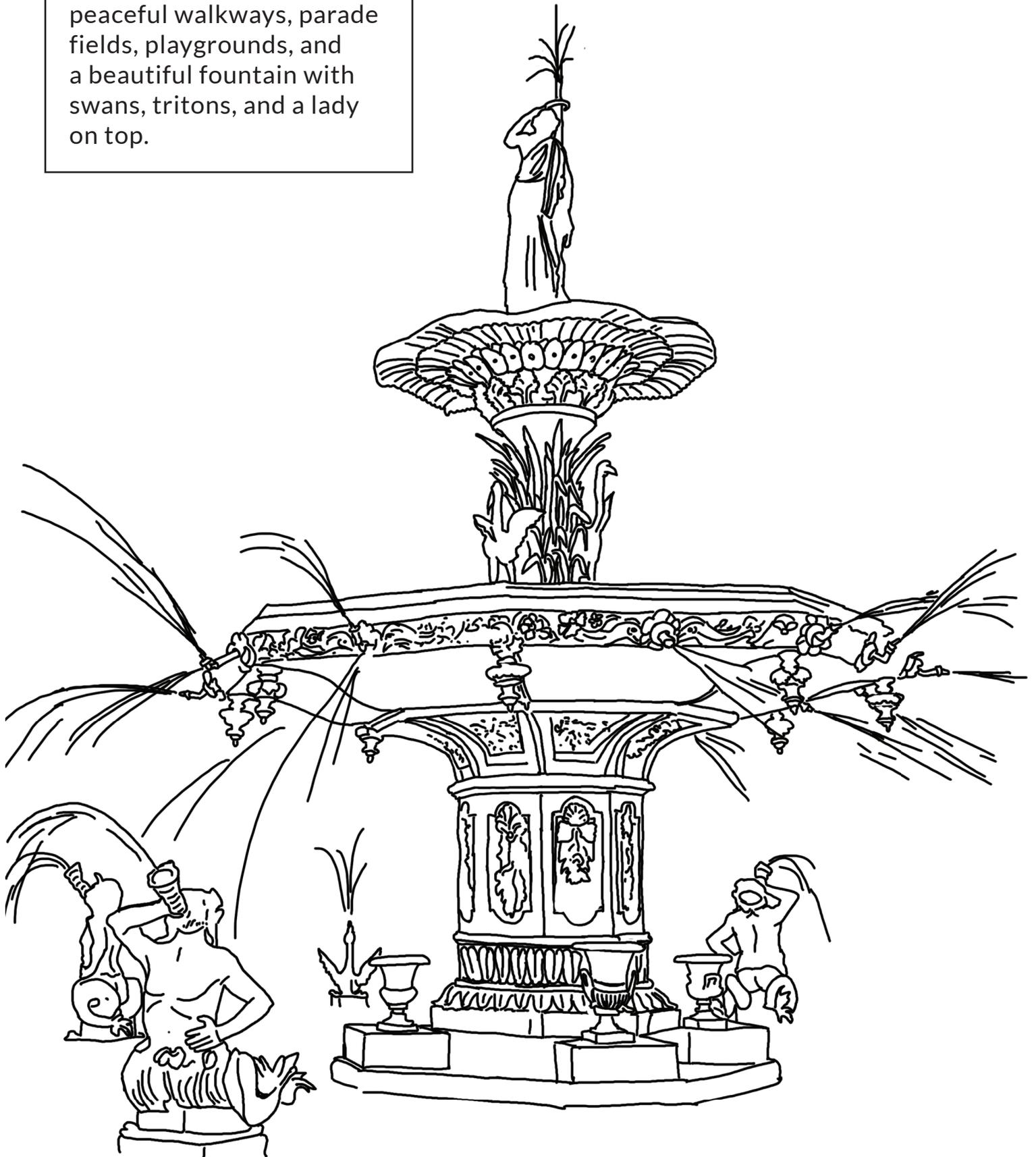
General James Edward Oglethorpe (1690 - 1785) led a group of colonists from England to settle Savannah and the new colony of Georgia in 1733.



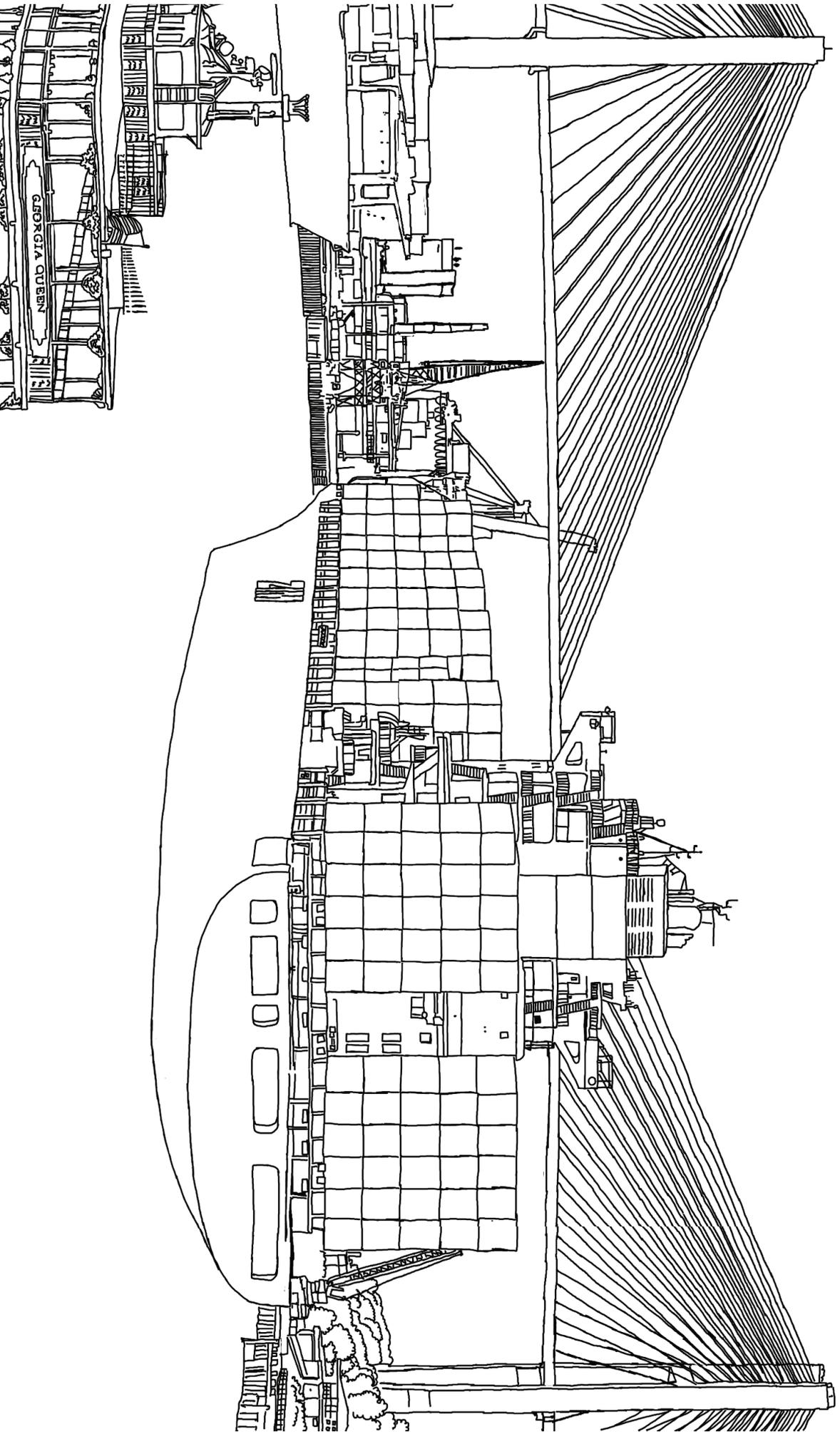


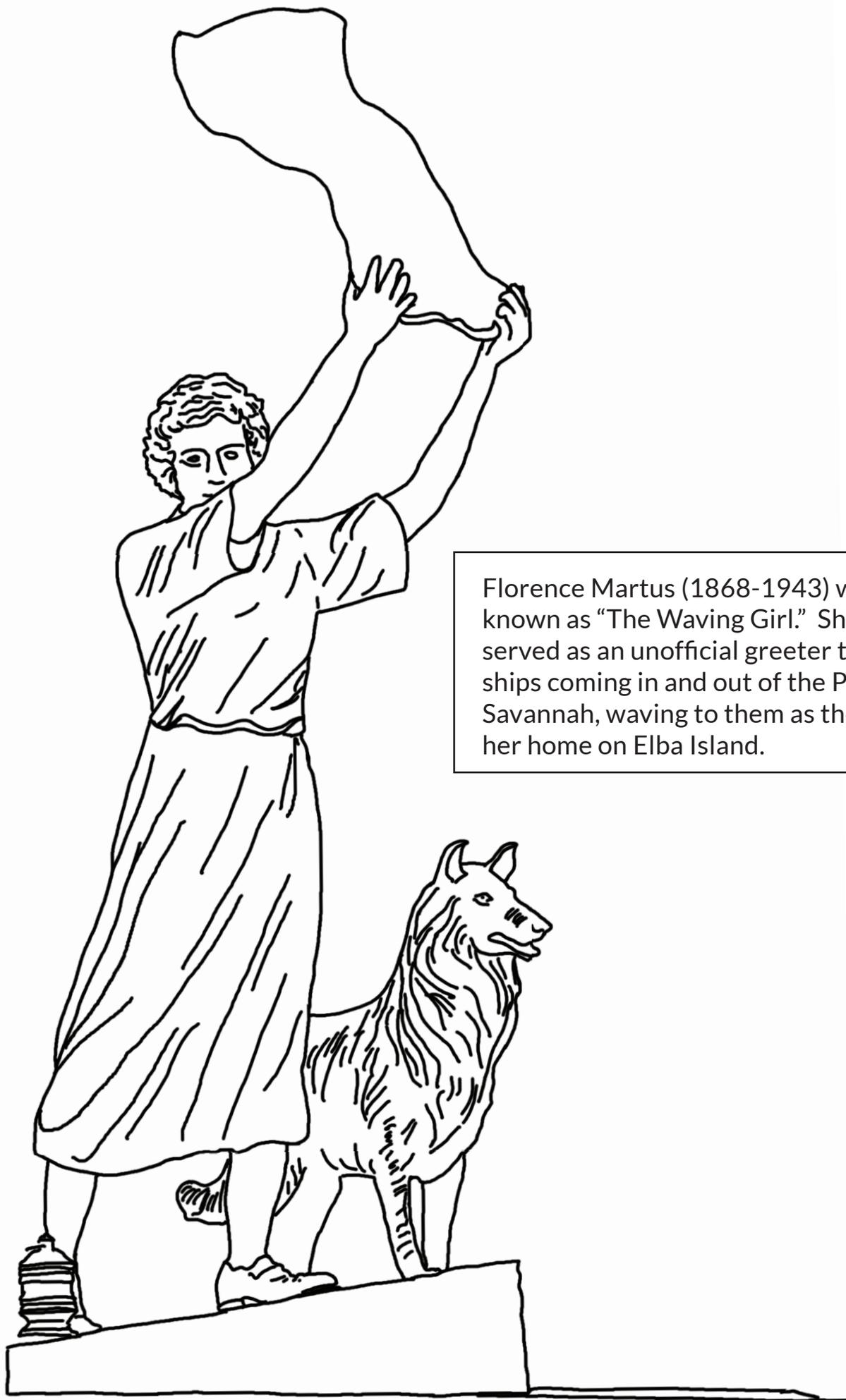
Sergeant William Jasper (circa 1750-1779) was an American soldier in the Revolutionary War, serving with the 2nd South Carolina Regiment. He was mortally wounded during the Siege of Savannah, a major battle fought on October 9, 1779 between British and American forces.

Forsyth Park is a grand park in the heart of Savannah. It was established in 1851 and features gardens, peaceful walkways, parade fields, playgrounds, and a beautiful fountain with swans, tritons, and a lady on top.



The Talmadge Bridge connects Georgia to South Carolina, spanning the Savannah River. Large cargo ships from around the world pass under the bridge each day on their way to the Georgia Ports, one of the largest ports in the nation.

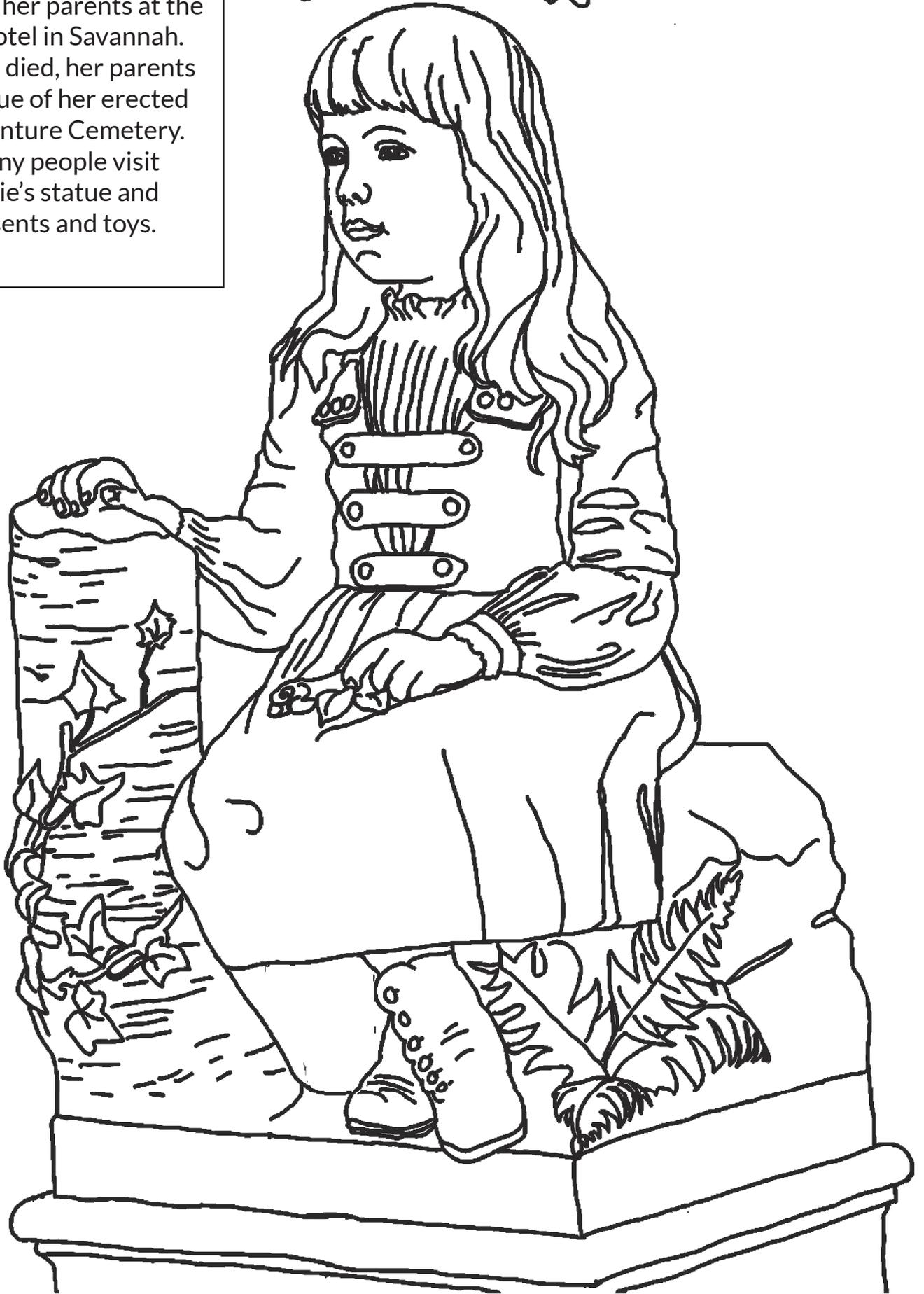




Florence Martus (1868-1943) was known as "The Waving Girl." She served as an unofficial greeter to all ships coming in and out of the Port of Savannah, waving to them as they passed her home on Elba Island.

Gracie Watson (1883-1889) lived with her parents at the Pulaski Hotel in Savannah. When she died, her parents had a statue of her erected at Bonaventure Cemetery. Today, many people visit little Gracie's statue and leave presents and toys.
