



## Survey Summary

*City of Savannah  
Strategic Planning Development*

### Introduction

The AskHumans survey for Savannah's Strategic Planning Development collected 1,229 responses, revealing community concerns and desires for change. Key themes include homelessness, affordable housing, public safety, economic development, and quality of life. The report analyzes these themes and highlights innovative ideas for future strategies and initiatives.

### Analysis by Question

#### Q1. What are you most proud of in the City of Savannah?

Savannah evokes immense pride in its residents, with respondents deeply appreciating the City's rich history and its dedication to preserving the historic district, with its stunning architecture.

Here are the key aspects that generate the most pride in respondents:

- **Historic Charm and Beauty:** Well-preserved history, beautiful architecture, unique squares, lush greenery (like Forsyth Park and the tree canopy), and an overall charming ambiance.
- **Strong Community and Culture:** Friendly and diverse population, a palpable sense of community, and a vibrant arts scene with local culture and festivals.
- **Walkability and Culinary Scene:** The ease of exploring the City on foot, especially downtown, and the diverse and appealing restaurant options.

#### Q2. In your experience, what is the most pressing issue facing our City?


Respondents expressed several key concerns about Savannah, with affordable housing and crime being the most prominent.

The main issues noted:

- **Affordable Housing Crisis:** High costs of rent and homeownership, a shortage of housing for average residents, and the overall impact of the cost of living.

- **Crime and Safety:** Worries about gun violence and violent crime, leading to a general lack of feeling safe.
- **Homelessness:** Concerns about the visibility and well-being of the homeless population and its effects on public spaces.
- **Infrastructure Deficiencies:** Issues with aging infrastructure, road problems (like potholes), drainage and flooding, and the need for better general maintenance.
- **Additional Concerns:** General economic hardship, City leadership and management, transportation challenges, impact of tourism, and development and planning issues.

### Q3. From your perspective, what specific actions would show you that the City is being fair and equitable to all residents? What, if anything, is getting in the way of the City being fair and equitable to ALL?

To show a commitment to fairness and equity, respondents believe the City should take concrete actions focused on equitable resource allocation and community engagement. This includes a clear commitment to distributing city funds, enforcing city codes, and improving infrastructure such as sidewalks and roads fairly across all neighborhoods, with specific attention to addressing blight and investing in historically underserved areas. Respondents shared the following actions that would show the City is being fair and equitable to all residents:

- Fair allocation of city funds and services across all neighborhoods.
- Targeted investment in historically underserved communities and blight removal.
- Ensuring equitable access to affordable housing and public services for all residents.
- Improved communication from the City and engagement with all communities.
- Transparency in decision-making processes.
- Diverse representation in city government and processes.
- Fair and consistent enforcement of laws and city codes across all areas and demographics.
- Support for local businesses, particularly those owned by minority groups.

Respondents identified several significant obstacles hindering the City's ability to achieve true fairness and equity. The influence of systemic bias or racism, along with the prioritization of the

tourism industry and the historic downtown over the needs of other neighborhoods, are also seen as major impediments.

- Historical neglect of certain (often minority) communities leading to current disparities.
- Systemic bias and racism influencing decision-making.
- Prioritization of the tourism industry and historic downtown over residents' needs.
- Political decision-making influenced by special interests or the "old guard."
- Lack of adequate resident input and transparency in decision-making.
- Implicit bias affecting resource allocation and policy.


#### **Q4. What issues are most important to you for your quality of life? How could the City work to improve the quality of life for you and your neighbors?**

Respondents identified several crucial elements that significantly influence their overall quality of life in the City. These encompass personal security and the prevalence of crime, the availability and affordability of housing, the cleanliness and environmental quality of the City, the state of its infrastructure, the ease of traffic flow and transportation options, the strength and character of local communities and neighborhoods, and the general cost of living. Key factors of quality of life include:

- Safety and Crime
- Housing (affordability and availability)
- Cleanliness and Environment
- Infrastructure
- Traffic and Transportation
- Community and Neighborhoods
- Cost of Living

To enhance their quality of life, respondents offered recommendations directly addressing the factors they highlighted. These suggestions include a focus on improving public safety measures, increasing the availability of affordable housing options, enhancing the cleanliness and maintenance of public spaces, making strategic investments in infrastructure, improving and expanding transportation options, supporting and investing in local neighborhoods, and effectively managing the impact of tourism on residents' daily lives, such as noise and congestion.

#### Q5. How concerned are you about homelessness in Savannah? How should the City respond to homelessness?


Survey participants voiced significant concern regarding the issue of homelessness in the City. Their responses indicated a desire for solutions that encompass both immediate assistance and sustainable long-term strategies, frequently highlighting the importance of a compassionate approach integrated with structured support systems. The need for improved housing and shelter options was a primary worry. Their concerns include:

- Lack of sufficient emergency shelter beds.
- Limited options for transitional housing.
- Absence of adequate long-term housing solutions with supportive services.
- The direct link between homelessness and the overall lack of affordable housing.
- General concern for the well-being of the homeless population.

Respondents offered a range of recommendations focused on providing comprehensive and humane solutions to homelessness. A key focus was on expanding housing and shelter options, including increasing emergency beds, developing transitional housing, and creating long-term housing with integrated supportive services. Participants also strongly emphasized the necessity of addressing the root causes of homelessness through improved access to mental health services, substance abuse treatment, job training and placement, and wrap-around support. These recommended solutions include:

- Increase the number of available beds in emergency shelters.

- Provide more options for transitional housing.
- Develop long-term housing solutions combined with supportive services.
- Address underlying issues: mental health services, substance abuse treatment, job training.
- Implement systemic approaches, foster partnerships, and improve leadership.
- Increase resources and make programs more accessible.
- Utilize evidence-based solutions, including targeted prevention and supportive services.
- Prioritize compassionate, resource-based solutions over solely enforcement-focused approaches.

**Q6. How concerned are you about public safety in Savannah? Do you feel safe in your neighborhood? What should the City do to improve public safety?**


Public safety emerged as a primary concern for many respondents, with specific worries about crime rates, gun violence, and a perceived lack of accountability. While most individuals reported feeling secure within their own neighborhoods, a significant number expressed feeling unsafe in other areas of Savannah. A smaller segment of respondents indicated feeling unsafe even in their own neighborhoods. They have concerns about:

- High levels of crime and gun violence.
- Perceived lack of accountability for criminal activity.
- Feeling unsafe in certain parts of Savannah, particularly at night.
- Property crime, such as car break-ins and theft.

Respondents offered several recommendations aimed at improving public safety and fostering a greater sense of security. A key suggestion was to increase police presence through more frequent patrols and greater visibility, especially in high-crime areas and during nighttime hours, including officers walking and biking. Fostering stronger relationships between the police and the communities they serve, with officers being more engaged and familiar with neighborhoods, was also seen as a possible solution. Other solutions include:

- Address underlying issues contributing to crime (poverty, lack of opportunity, drug addiction, mental health, unemployment).
- Improve street lighting in neighborhoods and public areas.
- Implement focused attention on reducing gun violence.
- Improve prosecution of crimes.
- Adopt a balanced approach incorporating compassion and accountability.

Q6 Sentiment Analysis




**Q7. How concerned are you about affordable housing in Savannah? How should the City respond to this problem?**

Respondents expressed significant concern about the lack of affordable housing and the increasing cost of living within the City. A particular worry was the displacement of long-term Savannah residents who are increasingly unable to afford to remain in their own homes due to rising prices. The impact of short-term rentals on the housing market was also a key concern, with many perceiving them as a factor driving up rental costs and prioritizing tourist interests over those of local residents.

Survey respondents offered a range of solutions to address the affordable housing crisis. The primary recommendation was to increase the overall housing supply by constructing more affordable units and offering incentives to developers to include affordable housing in their projects. Support for diverse housing types, such as tiny homes, accessory dwelling units, and duplexes/triplexes, along with the rehabilitation of blighted properties for housing, was also suggested. Respondents also discussed other potential solutions:

- Rehabilitate existing blighted properties for housing.
- Regulate short-term rentals through increased enforcement, limiting numbers (especially in residential areas), and increasing fees/taxes to potentially fund affordable housing.
- Implement rent control or stabilization measures.
- Reform zoning regulations to allow for more diverse and affordable housing options.
- Utilize city-owned land for affordable housing development.
- Provide property tax relief for residents.
- Increase support for homeownership initiatives.
- Focus affordable housing efforts on middle-income workers in addition to the lowest income brackets.

**Q8. What could the City of Savannah do to improve transportation? What would you like to see more of in Savannah: bus routes, bike lanes, walking and bike paths, traffic calming, and road improvement projects?**

Respondents expressed considerable worry regarding the current state of the City's infrastructure, particularly the deteriorating condition of roads and escalating traffic congestion. These issues have highlighted the urgent need for improved public transportation options and enhanced infrastructure for pedestrians and cyclists. The slow pace of necessary road repairs and the strain that rapid growth has placed on essential services were also noted as key concerns.

Respondents strongly advocated for significant improvements to the City's transportation infrastructure, with a particular emphasis on expanding and enhancing options for cyclists and pedestrians. This includes creating a connected network of safe and well-maintained bike lanes and paths linking neighborhoods and key destinations, with positive mention of the Tide to Town

project and the desire for its completion. Improving the frequency and reliability of public transit was also a prominent recommendation. Recommended improvements include:

- Enhance public transportation options.
- Expand and improve bike lanes and paths to create a connected network.
- Complete the Tide to Town project.
- Increase walkability through better pedestrian infrastructure.
- Implement regional transit planning.
- Invest in multimodal transportation options.
- Prioritize and expedite road repairs.
- Implement traffic calming measures.
- Improve the frequency and reliability of public transit.

### **Q9. How often do you use public parks and recreation facilities? How could the City improve public spaces?**

Savannah's public parks and squares are generally well-regarded and frequently used by residents who appreciate their beauty and maintenance. However, some limitations, like time constraints or location, prevent more frequent visits for some. Respondents offered suggestions to further enhance these spaces for everyone:

- Enhanced maintenance and cleanliness.
- Increased safety measures and better lighting, especially at night.
- Upgraded amenities such as benches, public restrooms, and water fountains.
- More diverse programming and events to attract a wider range of users.
- Improved accessibility for individuals with disabilities.
- Creation of more parks and green spaces, particularly in underserved areas.
- Preservation of existing green spaces to prevent development.

### **Q10. How important is having a strong local economy to you? How would you like to see the City support local economic growth and vitality?**

Respondents overwhelmingly agree that a robust local economy is crucial for Savannah's well-being. They emphasize the importance of supporting local businesses, fostering job creation, and achieving sustainable economic growth through various means.

Here are the key recommendations for strengthening Savannah's local economy:

- Support local and small businesses through reduced bureaucracy, financial assistance, and promotion.
- Invest in workforce development and provide support for entrepreneurs.
- Reduce barriers to opening local businesses, particularly by addressing high commercial rent costs.
- Diversify the economy by attracting and supporting industries beyond tourism, such as technology, manufacturing, healthcare, and the arts, to create more stable, higher-paying jobs.
- Provide targeted support, resources, and opportunities for minority-owned (particularly Black-owned) businesses.
- Ensure economic growth initiatives consider the impact on residents' quality of life, infrastructure capacity, and housing affordability.

## Q11. How often do you interact with City employees? How could the City improve interactions with City employees?

Interactions with City employees vary among respondents, ranging from frequent to rare depending on their connection to the City. While some report positive experiences, there's a general consensus on areas needing improvement to enhance these interactions and the overall functioning of City government.

Here are the key recommendations regarding City employees and leadership:

- **Customer Service Focus:** Emphasize the need for City employees to be more courteous, patient, helpful, empathetic, and less dismissive in their interactions.
- **Improved Responsiveness and Follow-Up:** Ensure City employees are more responsive to requests and follow through until issues are completely resolved.
- **Enhanced Employee Training:** Provide better training to ensure employees are well-informed about their responsibilities, can provide accurate information, and resolve issues efficiently on the first contact.
- **Increased Transparency:** Foster greater openness in City operations and decision-making processes.
- **Greater Accountability:** Implement mechanisms to ensure City employees and leadership are answerable for their actions and outcomes.
- **More Community Input:** Actively seek and incorporate community feedback in decision-making processes.
- **Improved Accessibility:** Make City government and its services more easily accessible to all residents.
- **Enhanced Communication:** Improve the flow of information between the City and its residents.






## Gender






## Do you live or work in the City of Savannah?

It's nearly impossible to establish routines with spouses, children, or any kind of outside responsibilities when your entire schedule flips every other month, and your days off vary week to week.</p> <p>To compound that issue, there is no additional compensation for officers who work the night shift. Most law enforcement agencies — including the one I came from — offer a night shift differential as recognition of the increased toll that working overnight takes on a person's health and life. Hold Repeat Offenders Accountable Partner with the court system to address the revolving door of violent offenders and ensure that consequences for serious crimes are meaningful and progressive. Support law enforcement with policies that give them the authority to intervene and enforce laws effectively. In addition, the city should prioritize the development of affordable and mixed-income housing through incentives, partnerships, and zoning reform. Stronger renter protections and anti-displacement policies are essential. Additionally, measures should be implemented to curb overinflation in home asking prices and prevent bidding wars that artificially drive-up costs.
